



FALL APPLICATIONS OPEN:

October 1st 2025

- At this time, universities will be considering your completed Grade 11 marks.
- Any available 30 level marks
 will be used over 20 levels

APPLICATIONS CLOSE:

April 30th 2026

- Deadline to self-report final high school marks in application if not yet accepted.
- Some deadlines are specific to the program you are applying to. You can check the <u>UofA's</u> website to check application deadlines for specific programs.

DEADLINES - MACEWAN



FALL APPLICATIONS OPEN:

October 1st 2025

- At this time, universities will be considering your completed Grade 11 marks.
- Any available 30 level marks will be used over 20 levels
- MacEwan also accepts winter and spring intakes.
- Winter Applications Open: February 1st
 2026
- Spring Applications Open: May 1st 2026

APPLICATIONS CLOSE:

Program Specific

- Application Deadlines at
 MacEwan are program specific, you can check the deadline for each program on
 MacEwan's website!
 - Most application deadlines are around April - June.



TYPES OF PROGRAMS

MAJOR/MINOR

Major – your main focus of study

 Around 60 credits from specific courses are required for your major (this can change depending on your program)

Minor - your secondary focus of study

• Less credits (about 12-24 creds min)

You are not required to take a minor!

DOUBLE MAJOR

Choosing two areas of study, must be under the same faculty (UAlberta)

MacEwan – Primary major and secondary majors can be mix and match from Arts and Sciences

One degree with both majors listed



TYPES OF PROGRAMS

HONOURS

Undergraduate degree that includes a research component.

Course load is specialized for your area of study, like a major, often more focused.

May have to take specific Honors classes

CERTIFICATE & DIPLOMA PROGRAMS

Shorter, more specialized programs

Training and hands-on experiences

A lot of them can be supplemental to a degree program

THINGS TO KEEP IN MIND

Program requirements change year to year, but most times will not affect you once you are enrolled

- If you apply to the Honours Physiology program for 2024–2025 and requirements change in the following year, those changes will **not** apply to you.
- Unless you switch programs, those that enrolled initially during 2024–25 school year will not be affected by changes to the program for the 2025–2026 school year, unless notified by the University (UAlberta)

People change their majors ALL THE TIME!

- Don't be afraid of changing programs if you aren't enjoying your classes
 - Access to Student Services Center (UAlberta) for your faculty for consultations
 - Academic Advising Center (MacEwan)
- Changing your program does not always mean extending your undergrad past 4 years



ENTRANCE SCHOLARSHIPS

TYPES

1. Admission-Based

• Automatically eligible after admitted into program

2. Application-Based

• Submit application to the provider

HOW TO APPLY

UAlberta: After admission → will need to create a CCID to apply for scholarships and then apply through Awards Hub

MacEwan: After admission → create account with MyStudentSystem and apply under Financial Aid



ADMISSION-BASED SCHOLARSHIPS







- Scholarships you are **automatically** considered for after being admitted into your program
 - No portal submissions, university will automatically match and inform you if you meet eligibility criteria
- Academic Average: Based on high school admission average at time of offer
 - Academic performance is judged comparative to other faculty/program applicants



Gold Standard Scholarship: top 5% of faculty, up to \$6000

UAlberta International Admission Scholarship: superior academic achievement, attending high school on a study permit, up to \$5,000.

University of Alberta Regional Excellence Scholarship: attending high school on a study permit with an admission average of 80%+, up to \$5,000.


MACEWAN

Chancellor Scholarships: Canadian/domestic students, scholarship amount based on tier of admission average (up to \$5000 for 95%+ average)

APPLICATION-BASED

SCHOLARSHIPS

- A. Application through university portal
 - UAlberta: complete a single application form to assess eligibility for all awards (automatically match you)
 - Application based on: academics,
 leadership, inclusion and financial need
- B. Application through external organization



Alexander Rutherford: receive up to \$2500, citizens/residents can apply

 Based off academic averages from all three grades: apply through Alberta Student Aid when official high school marks are available (mid-august), and enrolled in full-time post-secondary studies/apprenticeship program

Schulich Scholarship: (UALBERTA) receive 100/120K to students enrolled in STEM program, must be citizen

- Based on academic excellence, entrepreneurship goals, financial need*, intending to pursue STEM field in future
- High school selects one student to be their Schulich Leader
 Nominee → completes external app available through school

Loran Scholarship: (UALBERTA) recieve 100k + mentorship from previous Loran scholars, citizen/resident


- Based on character, service and leadership require 85+% and a referee to complete your recommendation
- Apply through website

TIPS FOR APPLYING

- Start Application Early! Allow yourself time to get letters of recommendation, transcripts, etc
- Ensure to include all financial information universities cannot disperse some scholarships without access to Canadian SIN number
- Expand your search scholarships are everywhere you look!
- Don't overlook small awards
- Write about your **leadership** experience







ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS AND COURSE PRE-REQUISITES

ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS

- All undergraduate programs require the completion of five specific Grade 12 subjects
- Vary by program but Will ALWAYS include English 30-1
 - Used to calculate admission average

HOW TO LOCATE REQUIREMENTS?

UALBERTA: Look at <u>program-specific</u> requirements

MACEWAN: Look at <u>Bachelor</u> requirements

COURSE PREREQUISITES (UALBERTA):

- Highschool classes required to complete the courses in the major/honours programs
- Not necessarily Grade 12 level courses
- Not always used in admission requirement/average if can be fulfilled by another more competitive course average
- Not all programs have separate course pre-reqs
- <u>Bachelor of Science</u> Courses

- *Important to regularly check admission requirements and course prerequisites for specific program*
- *Can be rejected from program if not considered in
 application*

NAVIGATING APPLY ALBERTA AND ENTERING GRADES INTO YOUR APPLICATION

- If you are applying earlier in October, you will not have your finalized grade 12 marks yet.
- The university will consider the marks from your grade 11 classes, and ask you to estimate your final grades for grade 12.
- Use your grade 11 marks when asked to estimate marks for grade 12 courses

- Conditional acceptance you will recieve shortly after your application, may take longer depending on the program (competitive programs tend to take longer to send these out)
- To retain your condition acceptance you must maintain a minimum average (typically around 70% - 75%) and cannot have a significant drop (about 10%) from your applying average.
- Once you graduate and your university receives
 your final transcript (typically this will be
 requested on your behalf) you will receive a final
 confirmation of admission

In your UAlberta and MacEwan applications, you will have to re-enter your grades into the required slots.



ENGLISH PROFICIENCY FOR INTERNATIONAL STUDENTS

- English Level Profiency (ELP)
- Spoken English Language Proficiency
- French Language Proficiency
- Bridging Program
- Different requirements for different programs!
- Deadlines to submit documents is usually in early August (Aug 1st in 2025) for high school applicants and around June for post–secondary transfers after admission

AP TRANSFER CREDITS

1. WHICH CREDITS CAN I USE?

- Grades get released in early July
- The University of Alberta and Macewan both accept an AP score of 4 or 5, while for NAIT it depends on the program.

2. USING TRANSFER CREDITS

- The CollegeBoard website can send your AP score report to a university of your choosing
- The first report is free to send, the rest are \$15 per report
- Transfer credits may be applied to specific courses or as general 100-level credit, and **do not affect your GPA**

UOFA

- Transfer credits are automatically processed by the UofA
- To decline credits, a form must be filled out. This decision is final

MACEWAN

- Accepting or declining transfer credits is done through the official Macewan website



LOANS & BURSARIES



WHY?

- Loans from AB and Canada are interest free for a year/6 months after your last year of study!
- You can opt-in to automatically be considered for eligible bursaries

HOW?

- Apply through Alberta Student Aid
- You will also need to make an National Student Loans Student Services (NSLSC) account keep these updated!!!
- NSLSC Now accessible through MCSA (My Canada Service Account)

WHEN?

- Applications for the fall/winter terms open in late June/early July
- Apply early as possible, at the latest 3 weeks before your school semester starts
- Workshops hosted by universities offered to you after admission (UAlberta)

DUAL-CREDIT COURSES

Dual-credit courses help you earn high school and university credits simultaneously. Institutions offering these courses may do so in an online, hybrid, or in-person format. They may be more academic-oriented, or career-oriented (eg. CTS - Career and Technology Studies).

These classes have costs associated with them, but they are often cheaper than the university-equivalent of the course.

CTS is unique in that it allows students to get into an apprenticeship program after university. In order to do this, you must complete a pathway and entrance requirements for your trade in high school. After high school, you may complete the exam and other steps necessary to obtain a Journeyperson Certificate.



- Cultural Awareness & Service Mindset: Building empathy and developing a lifelong commitment to giving back.


